

**SNOW REMOVAL RULES AND REGULATIONS
PROVIDED BY THE SAFETY DIRECTOR
(Ordinance 860.02. Passed 2-3-1975)**

1. All snowplow operators shall obey the Business Regulation Code, Chapter 860, and other ordinances, laws and these rules and regulations. Some specific, but not all inclusive, violations are as follows:

860.01 PERMIT REQUIRED.

Any person, firm or corporation using a vehicle or machine to remove snow from private driveways in the City for a fee or charge of any kind shall secure a permit from the Division of Police prior to doing any snow removal.

860.02 APPLICATION FOR PERMIT.

Prior to issuance of each permit, every applicant shall furnish the make, model and serial number of the vehicle to be used; and the name, address and telephone number of the owner and/or operator employed. Each applicant shall pay the sum of \$10.00 for the permit for each vehicle which shall cover the period from October 1st to April 15 of the following year.

860.03 DISTRIBUTION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The Safety Director shall provide, with each permit issued, a copy of the rules, regulations and ordinances of the City which pertain specifically and exclusively to snow removal.

860.04 REVOCATION.

The Snow Plow Permit may be revoked at any time by the Chief of Police for violation of this Business Regulation Code or ordinances or other laws or rules or regulations of the City, or other cause which the Chief of Police finds constitutes a danger or safety risk to persons or property in the City.

An aggrieved party may appeal the decision of the Chief of Police to the Safety Director within five (5) days of the date of written notice of permit revocation.

860.99 PENALTY.

Whoever violates any provision of this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree and shall be fined not more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) or imprisoned not more than 30 days, or both.

668.07 DEPOSIT OF SNOW.

(a) No person removing snow from any driveway or sidewalk within the City shall deposit the same on the pavement or sidewalk of any public street, or on any tree lawn or driveway, except on the premises from which the snow is removed.

(b) No owner, occupant or person in control of the premises from which snow is removed shall knowingly cause any person, by hire or otherwise, to deposit such snow in violation of this section.

(c) Whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor for a first offense; a misdemeanor of the fourth degree for a second offense; and a misdemeanor of the third degree for a third or subsequent offense.

660.19 UNLAWFULLY USING, OBSTRUCTING OR INTERFERING WITH FIRE HYDRANTS.

(a) No person, unless authorized by the City or except in the case of fire, shall tamper with, turn on, or use water from any fire hydrant, valve box, stopcock, pipe, apparatus or other fixture installed for the supplying of water or in any way use water therefrom for private use.

(b) No person, unless authorized by the City, shall interfere with or obstruct or permit to be obstructed or interfered with or cause to be obstructed any fire hydrant, valve box, stopcock, pipe, apparatus, or other fixture installed for the purpose of supplying water for the purposes of quenching fires in an emergency, by hiding or covering the same or permitting conditions to occur by which such apparatus or fire hydrants are hidden from public view.

(c) No person shall in any manner obstruct or cause or permit the obstruction from plain view of any fire hydrant.


(d) Whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.

Rule 001 CONTRACTOR PERFORMANCE

A Snow Plow Permit may be revoked or issuance refused by the Chief of Police when the applicant has demonstrated a history of poor performance in fulfilling customer contracts. The Chief of Police may use, but is not limited to, police reports, citations, newspaper accounts, court records, citizen complaints and better business reports in assessing the snowplow operator's performance.
